How to protect yourself during an earthquake

Japan is a country that experiences numerous earthquakes. Many of the buildings in Japan are highly earthquake-resistant and safe. But if a major earthquake occurs that makes you fear for your safety, you should act in accordance with the following guidelines.

When you feel the tremors from an earthquake or receive an earthquake early warning



When you are

- Protect yourself by taking cover under a sturdy table or similar object.
- Get away from any furniture or glass panes that could easily topple over.
- Do not rush outside.



When you are

Use a bag or hand luggage to protect

Get away from structures like concrete-block walls. and watch out for falling objects such as bricks, glass, or signboards.

Earthquake early warnings provide notification

of the names of earthquakes predicted to have a seismic intensity of 4 or greater before intense tremors arrive. People are notified of this along with a special warning sound conveyed via the means listed on the righ

Disaster Management Radio Communication Network

Once the tremors from an earthquake have stopped

Carefully ascertain the situation in the surrounding area and act calmly.

When you are at your hotel, shopping at a department store or supermarket, or in a theater or hall, act in accordance with the instructions of any public announcements or employees in the building (you may be asked to relocate to a location considered to be safe, such as an evacuation shelter).



Use websites and other sources to obtain accurate information.

- *If you are driving, come to a stop in a safe location before placing an emergency call.

Multilingual support for emergency calls to 119

It may take a little while for calls in English. Chinese, Korean, Portuguese, or Spanish to be connected, so please stay on the line without hanging up. Languages other than these will be accommodated to the extent possible.

*For crimes and accidents dial 110, which will connect you to the Police Call Center. Please be attentive, as the guidelines for placing emergency calls there differ from those for emergency calls to 119.

Guidelines for emergency calls to 119 and important points for filing reports

Emergency calls to 119 from a cellphone

- *Be aware that in some cases you may be unable to use cellphones brought from overseas in Japan.
- **Emergency calls to 119** from a public phone
- *Emergency calls to 119 can be placed from public phones without inserting money or using a card.
- *Lift the receiver and press the red button for reporting emergencies, then dial 119.



The operator will begin by inquiring into the necessary information in Japanese. If you require support in a foreign language, you will be connected to an interpretation center. The operator will ask you for the information in the table below, so please stay on the line without hanging up.

For Ambulance

*The operator will dispatch an ambulance and hang up the phone. Inform the ambulance crew of the specific details when they arrive.

If you don't know where vou are

- If there is a public phone or landline phone nearby, please call from there
- If you are outdoors, inform the operator of the names of nearby buildings, intersections, or other landmarks.
- If you are inside a train station, hotel, or building, you should ask a station attendant or other official to place the call for you.
- If you are in trouble, seek assistance from someone in your immediate vicinity right away
- The operator will search for your whereabouts to the extent possible based on the location information from the cell phone you are using. Turning on your location information service will make it easier to identify your location.

Items to have ready when calling an ambulance







Passport

- *Cash will be needed to pay for any consultation fees or doctor's fees after receiving a medical examination at a hospital
- *Ambulance crews will never demand cash for providing emergency
- *You are responsible for managing your valuables on your own or having family members do so.
